## Object Class attributes

Object class: <u>Dwelling</u>

**Definition:** A structure or a discrete space within a structure intended for people to live in or

where a person or group of people live.

**Context:** Dwellings are the main statistical unit in the housing sector. Information on the

number of occupied dwellings and tenantable and untenantable vacancies in a dwelling is collected by housing providers for planning purposes. Dwellings may be owned, managed, and/or made available for use by a specific program, including head-leased stock from **private** and **government** sources. Dwellings include

boarding house buildings and boarding house units.

### Collection and usage attributes

Guide for use: A structure that people actually live in is a dwelling regardless of its intended

purpose, but a vacant structure is only a dwelling if intended for human residence. A dwelling may include one or more rooms used as an office or workshop provided

the dwelling is in residential use.

<u>Boarding house rooms</u> or beds are not identified as separate dwellings unless they are self-contained. Self-contained rooms are therefore defined as units and

are counted as a separate dwelling.

For the public rental housing and state owned and managed Indigenous housing data collections, the number of tenancy (rental) units is used as a proxy for counting

the number of dwellings.
