## Collection and usage attributes

<b>Computation description:</b>	Local arrangements should specify that the consumer-focused information is: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• up-to-date</li><li>• from a clinically-appropriate source (e.g. from the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners or the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists), or adapted from such a source (and updated in line with the original source)</li><li>• provided to patients at an identified point in the care process (e.g. at presentation or following assessment and diagnosis).</li></ul>
<b>Computation:</b>	A healthcare setting where care is provided to patients with heavy menstrual bleeding which has documented evidence of local arrangements should record 'Yes'. Otherwise, the healthcare setting should record 'No'.
