	 The criteria and timeframes for referral, according to the specific clinical concern and/or suspected pathology.
	These criteria and timeframes should be based on clinical practice guidelines, including those which are locally endorsed, and should incorporate prompt referral for possible malignancy.
	Timeframes for referring patients who have not responded to pharmaceutical treatment should also be specified and ensure that referral has occurred after no more than six months of pharmaceutical treatment without a satisfactory response.
Computation:	A healthcare setting where care is provided to patients with heavy menstrual bleeding which has documented evidence of local arrangements should record 'Yes'. Otherwise, the healthcare setting should record 'No'.
