Description:	Proportion of regular clients who are Indigenous, aged 15 and over and who have had their alcohol consumption status recorded at the primary health-care service within the previous 24 months.
Rationale:	It is important to collect information on alcohol consumption because excessive consumption is associated with health and social problems in all populations, including the Indigenous population.

Population group age from:	15 years
Computation description:	<p>Proportion of regular clients who are Indigenous, aged 15 and over and who have had their alcohol consumption status recorded at the primary health care service within the previous 24 months.</p> <p>'Regular client' refers to a client of an Australian Government Department of Health-funded primary health-care service (that is required to report against the Indigenous primary health care key performance indicators) who has an active medical record; that is, a client who has attended the Department of Health-funded primary health-care service at least 3 times in 2 years.</p> <p>Alcohol consumption status has been recorded if the health service has either:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">a) a record of whether the client consumes alcohol or;b) a record specifying the amount and frequency of the client's alcohol consumption. <p>Results arising from measurements conducted outside of the service, that are known by the service, are included in the calculation of this indicator.</p> <p>Operationalisation of alcohol consumption status:</p> <p>Where an Indigenous regular client's alcohol consumption status does not have an assessment date assigned within the Patient Information Record System (PIRS), alcohol consumption status as recorded in the PIRS should be treated as current (i.e. as having been updated within the previous 24 months).</p> <p>Presented as a percentage.</p>
Computation:	$(\text{Numerator} \div \text{Denominator}) \times 100$

Numerator: Number of regular clients who are Indigenous, aged 15 and over and who have had their alcohol consumption status recorded at the primary health care service within the previous 24 months.
