CODE 1 Colonoscopist

A medical professional who administers a colonoscopy.

CODE 2 General practitioner

A medical professional who treats acute and chronic illnesses and provides preventive care and health education to patients.

CODE 3 Nurse

A nursing professional who focuses on care of individuals, families and communities. Nursing professionals include enrolled nurses, registered nurses and nurse practitioners.

CODE 4 Anaesthetist

A medical professional who administer sedation that have the ability to bring about a reversible loss of consciousness.

Staff performing sedation should comply with Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists (ANZCA) standards (ANZCA 2014). Deep sedation and general anaesthesia may only be used in the presence of an anaesthetist or other appropriately trained and credentialed medical specialist within his/her scope of practice. Non-anaesthetist medical staff require adequate training in the safe and correct usage of sedation equipment and drugs, and in the management and monitoring of sedated patients in accordance with the guidelines.
