- 1. Each child is only counted once. Only the first notification that resulted in a substantiation during the reporting period is counted.
- 2. Time-to-admission is calculated from the date of this substantiation, even if there was another substantiation that occurred earlier but which came from a different (and later) notification than the first notification.
- An age limit of less than 17 at the time of substantiation was applied to allow for a 12-month follow up where the child is still eligible for entry to out-of-home care.
- 4. Children who were in out-of-home care at the time of the substantiation were excluded from both the numerator and denominator.
- Children on third-party parental responsibility orders at the time of substantiation are not excluded, however, as under the national out-of-home care scope children on these orders are not considered to be in out-of-home care.

Comments:

This indicator serves as a proxy for preservation.

It should be noted that data for this indicator are not comparable across jurisdictions due to differences in the way jurisdictions collect and report data on notifications, investigations and substantiations. See Appendix A of <u>Child</u> <u>protection Australia 2020–21</u> for further details (AlHW 2022b). The interpretation of this indicator can be further complicated because preservation may not always be considered an ideal outcome for the child.

Although jurisdictions agreed that substantiation is the appropriate point at which to measure preservation, they also highlighted that there are other preservation methods not captured by this indicator. For example, departments can decide not to substantiate and instead keep a case open and work with the family.

Additional issues related to the use of this indicator as a measure of preservation include that:

- it offers no insight into the use and subsequent success rate of early intervention and family support services used by departments to support preservation
- it does not capture the fact that preservation is not always a safe outcome.
