Data quality

Data quality statement summary:

The Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (ACSQHC) established the National Hand Hygiene Initiative (NHHI) in 2008 as part of a suite of initiatives to prevent and reduce healthcare-associated infections in Australian healthcare settings. The National Safety and Quality Health Services (NSQHS) Standards require health service organisations to have a hand hygiene program consistent with the NHHI and jurisdictional requirements. The NHHI uses a multimodal approach to improving hand hygiene, which includes:

- The use of alcohol-based hand rub at the point-of-care
- Ensuring uniform hand hygiene and infection prevention and control education
- Monitoring hand hygiene compliance and performance feedback
- Using hand hygiene programs that ensure culture change.

Implementation of the NHHI is led by states, territories and health service organisations (public and private).

Institutional environment:

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AlHW) is an independent corporate Commonwealth entity under the <u>Australian Institute of Health and Welfare Act 1987 (AlHW Act)</u>, governed by a <u>management board</u> and accountable to the Australian Parliament through the Health portfolio.

The AIHW is a nationally recognised information management agency. Its purpose is to create authoritative and accessible information and statistics that inform decisions and improve the health and welfare of all Australians.

Compliance with the confidentiality requirements in the AlHW Act, the Privacy Principles in the <u>Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)</u> and the AlHW's data governance arrangements ensures that the AlHW is well positioned to release information for public benefit while protecting the identity of individuals and organisations.

Audit data are provided three times a year by health service organisations to the

ACSQHC. After its analysis and reporting of the national dataset, the ACSQHC provides the data to AlHW. Transfer of data from ACSQHC to AlHW normally occurs two months after the close of the audit period. The audit periods are from:

- 1 November to 30 March
- 1 April to 30 June, and
- 1 July to 31 October each year.

The reference period for this data set is from November 2012 onwards.

Accessibility:

Timeliness:

The AIHW publishes data from the NHHI annually in the 'Hospital safety and quality' series and can be accessed on the:

- AIHW website
- or individual hospitals on the MyHospitals website. These data may be accessed on the MyHospitals website.

Interpretability:

Information on the definitions used for the NHHI, including observed moments, total moments and health worker types are available on the AlHW's online metadata repository (METEOR). METEOR can be accessed on the AlHW website.

Relevance: Hand hygiene is considered to be a robust measure of the quality of a health

service organisation's infection prevention and control program. Data from this collection is used by the AIHW as an indicator about the safety and quality of care

in Australian hospitals.

Hand hygiene compliance is reported as a national rate, as well for individual public health service organisations, healthcare worker group, and by each moment for hand hygiene. Compliance rates are compared against the current national benchmark of 80%, which was endorsed by the former the Australian Health

Ministers' Advisory Council (AHMAC) in October 2015.

Accuracy: The ACSQHC is primarily responsible for the quality of the data they provide.

However, the AlHW undertakes validations on receipt of data. Data are checked for valid values, logical consistency and historical consistency. Potential errors are queried, and corrections and resubmissions may be made by the ACSQHC in response to these edit queries. The AlHW does not adjust data to account for possible data errors or missing or incorrect values, except as stated above.

Coherence: The exclusion of standalone long term care facilities from national data set came

into effect from Audit 1 2021. This action was undertaken to ensure that the national hand hygiene compliance rate reflects hand hygiene performance at the health service level, in line with purpose of the national hand hygiene. This change would

have caused little impact as it involved less than 15 organisations in total.
